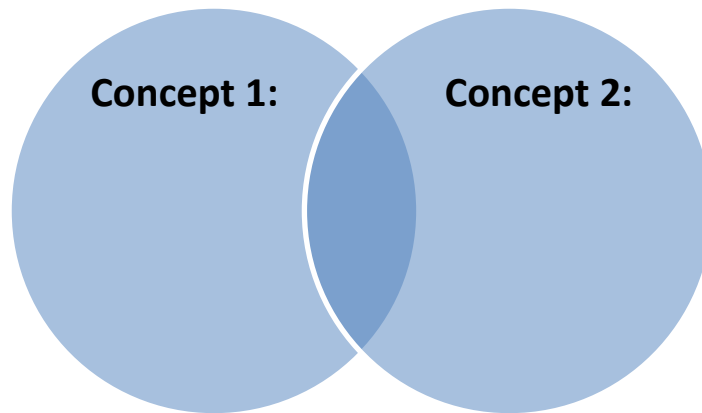


**Pre Writing:**

**Gathering Citation Information:**

It is important to tell your reading audience whose works influenced your paper to give appropriate attribution to others' intellectual work and avoid plagiarism. Let's look at examples of the indexes for one each of our three electronic resource types. Each example will be followed by the correct way to cite it in APA.

**eReference Book:**

The above citation was taken as a screen shot, showing what the Credo Digital Reference Database provided. Make sure to compare such examples against your APA citation style guide; the appropriate citation style for this kind of resource is covered on page 205 of the 6<sup>th</sup> edition manual. This entry is correct as shown.

Using the above information, you would cite this according to the rule found on the APA Style Blog's website (<http://blog.apastyle.org/apastyle/2011/06/how-do-you-cite-an-e-book.html>), which states that "If the book was read or acquired through an online library (e.g., Google Books, ebrary, NetLibrary) and not on an e-reader device, omit the bracketed information from the reference." Therefore, the book is referenced like this:
